Kirk Session

Following Alasdair's departure, under the new Presbytery Plan, it was agreed that when Aberdour St Fillan's became vacant that charge would be reduced to a 50% ministry with the other 50% coming to Dalgety to provide parish assistance. Given the size of our parish and Christine's workload and with the support of Presbytery, we requested the 50% now and Ministries Council agreed.

Having considered what we want a new parish assistant to do, the Kirk Session has decided that we will advertise for a full-time worker, with Dalgety Parish Church meeting the other 50% of the cost. The Kirk Session, together with Human Resources at Church of Scotland, is preparing a job specification for a new parish assistant. It is hoped this post will be advertised within the next 2 months.

Engcongolweni – Umoza mwakhristu

The harvest has been gathered and reports suggest that, following the disastrous flooding in January, the yield overall has been badly affected and by the spring of next year much of Malawi could be suffering from hunger. The Engcongolweni harvest has been affected but not as badly as in the south where the maize crop was devastated.

Good news coming from Engcongolweni is that the Water Project which was completed and dedicated in July last year has expanded. Geoffrey Simbeye, who heads up the Engcongolweni Partnership Committee, sent an e-mail, in which he said:

“Am also happy to inform you that the water pipes have increased from 15 standing



pipes to 40 standing pipes and within a few weeks will have further increased to 70 standing pipes, many serving individual houses. People are very happy that there is no longer a problem with water. This has resulted in less problems with water-borne diseases which was a very big problem.” The water project was never about just getting water to the community; it was about improving the health of the community, reducing the number of infant deaths and bringing down the number of children missing school through illness.

Geoffrey also indicated that the MP for the neighbouring northern constituency had become involved as he was keen for the water system to be extended to serve his constituents, particularly those at the Erukweni maternity unit – about 10 kms further north. This would be of immense benefit to the local people and the more people with access to clean water, the better it is for all.

On another positive, and definitely exciting, note the Kirk Session has approved a visit from our Friends in Engcongolweni during September next year. This is still fairly 'hot off the press' and there are no details yet of who might come or when, how long they might stay or what our programme



might be. We will probably work on a visit duration of 10 – 12 days but the Engcongolweni Support Group will be meeting to thrash out all the details. The last time Engcongolweni visited was in September 2009, when Rev Joshua Nyangulu led a large team of church people and school teachers. The plan this time is to invite 4 or 5 Church people and give them an opportunity to see at first-hand what life is like in a Scottish congregation.

Early next year we will need to embark on some fund-raising to cover the visit costs. These (at the moment) are roughly around £1,500 per person, based on hospitality being provided by members of the congregation. Nearer the time, we will be inviting people to offer bed space, meals, transport etc. This will be a great opportunity to welcome our friends and strengthen the bonds between us.

On a sunny day in June (yes, there was one!) three car-loads of knitted goods, along with donated items of toiletries and pencils, were delivered to The Raven Trust in Strachur. A drive alongside Loch Lomond, up the Rest and Be Thankful and down the edge of Loch Fyne was wonderful and a warm welcome awaited from Sue Challis at Strachur. The shipment is due to leave late August/early September and the 28 boxes should arrive in Engcongolweni before Christmas. At least two boxes



are destined for the orphans at each Prayer House. Many thanks to those of you who donated goods or money towards these gifts and many thanks also, to those who helped pack the boxes and deliver them to Strachur.

Path of Renewal

20 Congregations from across the Church of Scotland will form a pilot group for the Path of Renewal Project. This will be led by the Rev Graham Duffin, Minister at Loanhead, in his role within the Panel on Review and Reform. The Rev Liz Crumlish has been selected to be the Coordinator, and I am privileged to have been asked to work alongside her as a consultant to this major change process from 1 September this year.

The Path of Renewal project will train, coach and mentor the Ministers, Sessions, and Congregations of 20 churches over a period of 2-3 years with the aim to helping of them become truly Missional. Through participation in this project they will learn new skills, understand change processes and how to do things in entirely new and creative ways. These skills will help the bring the Gospel to the communities of which they are a part.

Some 45 congregations have asked to be considered for the project and the first task is to devise a fair, consistent and objective selection process, by deciding what criteria will apply and then devising interview questions. Once the 20 churches have been selected we will search for coaches and mentors in time for the project to start from 1 January 2016.

Assuming the pilot is a success, and this has to be more than a hope, the project will be 'rolled out' to the rest of us from 2017/2018.

Please pray for everyone involved; for discernment, good judgement, impartiality, energy, enthusiasm, motivation and tirelessness (not much there, really!)
